

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

"These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world" – John 16:33

These words from Jesus's goodbye speech at the Last Supper in John's gospel are an important reminder in this Easter season, especially amid the turmoil of this world, and the division among fellow citizens and even fellow Christians.

Jesus says following him will not be easy. He tells his disciples that they will be scattered. He says they will leave him. He speaks at first directly about his crucifixion, but in the next chapter he prays for both his disciples on that night of trial, and all of us who will believe based on their witness.

Jesus says that in the world, we will have tribulation. This is a great translation, as it means "pressures" or "oppression." Today, "tribulation" often gets associated with final judgment, when in truth, tribulation has been a constant for Christians in every age.

Tribulation is the pressure we feel when the world tells us to seek our own power, popularity, and prosperity to protect our worldly identities, while Jesus says to lay down everything for him. Tribulation is the feeling of being trapped by the world as we strive to live faithfully. Yet, Jesus says to "be of good cheer," or have courage, confidence, or boldness because he has overcome, or literally, "won victory" over the world.

This is the victory of the Resurrection, which we celebrate at Easter. The life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus are the center of our faith. We are tempted to lose sight of this and seek worldly things on the world's terms. But Jesus calls us to see his self-giving love and respond by loving God with all we have and loving our neighbors as ourselves.

Jesus doesn't promise this will be easy, but he promises that he will never leave us or forsake us. You and I cannot fix the turmoil of this world. But we can partner with Christ in his ministry of reconciliation, trusting in him who lived, died, and rose again.

This Easter season, remember that God has already won the victory, and the Holy Spirit empowers us to pray, serve, and give generously, all in faithful allegiance to our Lord Jesus. We may face the pressures of this world, but in Christ, we can share God's love and alleviate the suffering of others.

From the Desk of Carol Ann

"It's Friday... But Sunday's Comin'!"

As April blooms around us, I am reminded of the promise of renewal and the hope that comes with each passing season. And no matter how heavy our burdens feel, Sunday is always on the horizon.

Whether you're facing a personal "Friday" right now or basking in the "Sunday" moments of joy, remember that God's love carries us through every season. Trust me, I have been through the "Friday" season but Sunday is coming!

So, this April, as flowers bloom and life reawakens around us, let us be reminded of the ultimate truth of Easter: no matter the trials we face, we are people of hope, and we are Easter people. May we live with the joy of the risen Christ shining through us.

What is Emergency Assistance? Shelby Presbyterian Sharing God's Love

In 2023, at Montreat, in small groups, you were asked about what you loved most about Shelby Presbyterian Church, and where we might do more. In every group, you said you loved SPC's commitment to being a community of believers in fellowship, and the church's commitment to helping the larger community with missions.

It is wonderful to see this community bonding in worship, with our retreat, game nights, the dessert auction, and more. Likewise, the generosity of the church in supporting and doing mission work is awe inspiring, both through SPC ministries and beyond.

One key ministry is the Emergency Assistance Program. Every day, your neighbors call or stop by in need of help with pressing needs. Because of your generous support, hundreds of your neighbors in 2024 received assistance totaling nearly \$60,000. This was funded by \$18,000 from the church budget, \$25,000 from outside gifts, and the rest from your generosity. You are one church making a BIG difference.

For 2025, we need your help again – both financially and as volunteers. The Session has approved a new part-time position to train volunteers to help. We have one volunteer and Marie Jackson, who has seamlessly moved from Sexton to Volunteer Trainer, who have been helping Miranda and Drew with the emergency assistance cases.

Volunteers will be expected to take calls, ask questions, give a sympathetic ear, share the love of God in Christ, and determine how best to help in partnership with other community resources. **Would you be interested in helping for four hours a week?**

With the growing need in our community, we likewise are asking you to prayerfully consider a donation to the Emergency Assistance fund, beyond your existing pledge, to help beyond the budgeted funds. Thank you in advance for your consideration.

SPC Reports & Minutes

SESSION MEETING MINUTES - February 18, 2025

<u>Clerk</u>: Tom Martin complimented Drew and Carol Ann for planning and implementing an insightful officers' retreat. He further expressed gratitude for the diligent efforts of Miranda, Sherry, and Emily to update and compile the officer handbook. Tom reported that former SPC pastor, Fred Rose, is holding his church officers' retreat here at SPC this coming Saturday. <u>Diaconate Report</u>: Michelle Moser reported that the Media Committee is looking at ways to get members to use the new MinistryOne app and is planning to have committee members available during Wednesday Night Suppers to assist with loading the app to phones and answer usage questions. She highlighted the Discipleship Committee's upcoming Game Night and a possible craft night with the goal of providing opportunities for SPC members to socialize here at church during the year. There are several baptisms and a wedding coming up. Recent issues with doors not closing and locking after worship on Sunday were discussed.

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: Allen Callahan passed this morning. The funeral is tentatively scheduled for March 1. A shooting today on Blanton Street during Rainbow hours prompted a lockdown of the church building, resulting in a delay in setting up the blood drive and affecting donor participation numbers. The New Member class is going well. It's wonderful to continue to see new faces among us. He encouraged us to be mindful of those in our neighborhood groups who may be absent and need attention. He welcomed us to provide suggestions for improving the officers' retreat. Drew reported that Carol Ann's friend, Mr. Michael, is getting closer to needed hospice care. Please keep them both in prayer. Looking at the Statistical Report, he is excited to see the impressive amount SPC spends on outreach beyond our gift to the Presbytery.

Online Votes and Minutes: The online votes to approve the baptisms of Winston Childers on 2/16 and Nora Monroe on 2/23, as well as the 2024 Statistical Report, were ratified unanimously. Motion to approve the minutes from the January 21, 2025, session meeting passed unanimously.

<u>Discipleship Committee</u>: Drew presented that two youth, Khia Hickman and Foster Warrick, have applied to attend Triennium this July as members of the WNC Presbytery's delegation. Total cost is \$727. The PWNC will subsidize \$329 per delegate. Each youth will pay \$164. The committee is asking the church to provide per youth \$164 from the youth budget (51050) and \$70 from the PWNC budget. Furthermore, Carol Ann will provide them with \$100 each from the youth account (22024) to help cover "on the road" meals and snacks. Motion approved unanimously. The committee has already begun planning this year's congregational retreat at Montreat, but is also working on opportunities to be in community and fellowship here at home.

<u>Finance Committee</u>: Richard Dedmon reported that offerings and revenue in January were up over last year, providing 9.2% of expected annual income in just one month. Furthermore, January expenses were under budget, so we're in good shape as we kick off the year. The Cornerstone fund and other investment accounts will be moved to Fidelity Bank. In light of the ongoing battle with the insurance company over the needed roof repair, we have hired a public adjuster from Charlotte to handle negotiations with the insurance company. The adjuster will retain a fee of up to 15% of any portion of settlement beyond the original offer paid. The committee has approved Session's requested expenditures: \$20,000 from the Cornerstone Fund for an energy efficiency project including insulation and lighting, and \$7500 from undesignated memorial gifts from the Memorial Fund to cover the Historical Archive Project expenses.

Member Life: Mike Alexander presented the committee's motion to approve transfer of Andy and Ann Brown's membership to Sparta Presbyterian Church, and reported they are well and eagerly awaiting to take occupancy of their newly built home. Motion approved unanimously. Drew presented Andrea Rodgers' request to reactivate her membership. (She is the daughter of member Agaat Den Hertog.) Elders agreed that examination by the Session is not necessary. Motion approved unanimously. Drew will offer Andrea the opportunity to stand with the new member class before the congregation, and her name will be listed with theirs in the bulletin.

<u>Property Committee</u>: Bill Jobe reported work on the ceilings of the closets at the rear of the stage in preparation for insulation. Fred Blackley negotiated and secured a new landscape contractor, Fitz McMurray. He will start at the same price Ted LeGrand was charging. The attic space off the resource room (education wing, upstairs) needs to be cleared in preparation for insulation. Contents include old softball trophies and some furniture. Dan McLaurin agreed to go through it for the Historical subcommittee. Ceiling leaks in the education wing may need to be addressed before the insulation is placed. Most are slow but enough to damage the ceiling tiles.

Worship and Music Committee: Drew presented the funeral of George Cribb on 3/29 for approval. (He was SPC's long-time choir director prior to Anne Goss and Amy Allen.) Unanimously approved.

OLD BUSINESS: none.

<u>NEW BUSINESS:</u> Discussion of ideas for neighborhood group activities and service—cards, phone calls, event reminders, visits. Some elders may attend a future diaconate meeting to share ideas. Discussion of homebound communion.
