

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

A poll last month found that nearly 95 percent of Americans are concerned by an apparent rise in political violence, a growing divide, and increasingly toxic rhetoric. This alarm led some to make end-times predictions as we remain shocked by recent events.

However, we are still here. What's more, the whole of scripture points to our God coming down into the mess of human life. We need only to look at the Lord's Prayer – "your will be done on earth as it is heaven" – and at the very incarnation of Jesus himself to see this. Yet, like the Psalmist, we wonder – "How long O Lord?"

So then, the question is this: How shall we live? How do we respond?

As Christians, our faith is in the Lordship of Jesus who reigns over all of creation and is with us by the presence of the Holy Spirit in and among us. Jesus told his disciples they would be scattered and face tribulation, but he said, "Be brave. I have overcome the world."

Scripture says a great cloud of witnesses have come before us and that the gates of hell, or death itself, will not prevail over the church – the witnesses past and present. Yes, churches close, but the capital "C" Church remains. Our job is to be faithful to King Jesus, and trust that nothing can separate us from the love of God in him.

We must resist the urge to "protect" God, who is our protector. This is not faith. Our calling is to be faithful to the person, work and example of Christ, who saves us by the self-giving love of God. God is working all around us in self-giving love, and we are called not to compete with the world, but to participate in its reconciliation.

Jesus has already won the victory. The world wants us to compete with the world in culture wars because then we will play its game of hating our enemies, loving only those who love us, and putting first our in-group's safety, belonging and purpose.

The way of Jesus is the confidence that we are already safe in his arms, we belong to him, and our purpose is to love one another as he has loved us. Trusting his love and our salvation, we can choose the love that casts out fear, even loving our enemies. We can invest in the Kingdom of God above the priorities of this world because the Spirit of God is in and among us, revealing God in every generous act of self-giving love.

What a weekend we shared together in Montreat! From the one-year-old to the joyful 90-year-old, our whole church family came together for laughter, worship, play, and connection. Everywhere you looked, there was something to smile about—kids splashing and stomping in the creek, folks gathered around tables puzzling and playing games, groups cheering during chair volleyball, softball and kickball, and families enjoying hikes in the mountains. The joy of being together was unmistakable.

Our theme, Linked by Love, was not just something we talked about—it was something we lived. One person shared, "I am so blessed to have a church family willing to spend this time together." That blessing could be seen in the way children, parents, grandparents, and friends from every generation found themselves linked together in laughter and fellowship. Another reflected, "I enjoyed getting to know folks I only knew by face." Those casual moments—playing a game, walking a trail, or simply sharing a meal—turned acquaintances into friends.

For many families, the retreat was more than a getaway – it was a time of renewal. One family told us, "It was a joy for the whole family unit. That's the beauty of Montreat: all ages under one roof, growing closer to one another and to Christ.

Of course, none of this would have been possible without the hard work and dedication of so many who planned, prayed, and prepared for our time away. And we are especially **grateful for the Lacey Fund for Montreat**, which Morris and Mabel Lacey set up to help subsidize the cost, and made the retreat affordable for many families. After four years, that fund is nearly depleted, however, and we hope that if you are able to give to this fund, you will do so. Your generosity ensures that retreats like this remain a blessing for everyone in our church family.

As we drove away from Montreat, our hearts were full. We came as individuals and families, but we left reminded of the ties that hold us together. Truly, we are a people linked by love – God's love for us all.



KITCHEN RENOVATION PROJECT TO START THIS MONTH!

Upgrades to Kitchen, Ellis Hall, and Harrill House Will Benefit SPC Ministries, including Food Ministry, Fellowship

Session has approved a renovation project that will month and be completed by the end of January.

<u>Finance:</u> Drew—we now have possession of the Cribb Fund, value of which is more than anticipated. The monthly statement shows that while behind on giving, it is less than what is typical at this time of the year and spending is under control. Update–Worship & Music Committee's request for money from the Cribb Fund was amended because the AC for the choir and bell rooms has died. Finance recommends withdrawing \$17,500 for stated music needs and to install 2 minisplit units. Approved unanimously.

<u>Property</u>: Bill Jobe – the attic behind the resource room has been cleared for insulation. Miller Condrey will begin installing mini-split units in Harrill House. Ice maker was cleaned today and added to an annual schedule. Quote obtained for a water filter for it. They determined that the unit in the kitchen is actually a dishwasher that needs repair. Kitchen renovation bid requests have been sent. Bids due 8/28. Ideally work will be done between 10/6 and 12/31. Special session meeting may be called to address bids. Carport project in progress. Carpets to be cleaned Friday. New janitorial service, Sparkles, started Monday. F3 classroom will be locked when not in use due to mobile keyboards stored inside. Today was Scott's one-year anniversary. Leak in Scout section of Harrill House has been addressed.
