Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Well, this has been an interesting first month. I have really enjoyed getting to know so many of you, listening to your stories, praying with you, and learning about your vision for our church. We have been overwhelmed by your kindness and support. We are so thankful for you.

And then there's COVID.

Getting to know you is harder from home confinement. Harder still when you are caring for your 3-year-old daughter who shares your infection, while your healthy wife and son stay away. It's tough to make phone calls and write newsletter articles when you hear that sweet little voice, 'Papa, will you play with me?'

With that said, the Lord uses our struggles for good. We had wonderful participation online for our basement service and Carol Ann did a wonderful job preaching the next week. It is a treat when someone preaches well from Song of Solomon, and I'm grateful to her for it. If I'm honest, I would not have been so brave.

Likewise, I pray that this brush with Coronavirus reminds us of our duty to love one another. I know this congregation has lost loved ones to this virus and I know so many of you have already taken the wise step of getting the vaccine, as I had. However, knowing I was 'safe' or, at least 'safer,' I had become lax in my precautions. Because I was fine, I thought I was not a risk to others.

This Delta variant is a serious risk to many in our church and in our community. Waiting for this to wave pass and for more of our neighbors to be vaccinated, we need to be mindful that loving others

means acting in their interests before our own. This means wearing masks, limiting our exposure to others, and focusing on preserving what matters most, rather than just doing what we want. As I write this paragraph, I'm preaching to myself here. This is where I failed, and because of God's grace, I'm willing to admit my sins.

The word 'holy' in Hebrew and Greek means to be 'set apart' or 'different.' God is 'holy' because God is set apart from creation, eternal and unchanging. But what's more, God's love is holy because it is faithful when human affections are conditional. Holiness stands out.

We as Christians are called to be set apart or holy in the way we love. Jesus said that people will know his disciples by how they love one another. This is our call to holiness: We love God and love our neighbor in such a way that, we seem different in this world. Paul says to outdo one another in how we love.

So, this is my challenge to you amid this wave – outdo me and learn from my mistakes. I could have infected others and I know I put some of you at risk. Outdo me – Wear your mask. If you're not vaccinated yet, please strongly consider it. Be safe but stay involved. Participate on Sundays in person and online. Do not shy away from helping others, and let's give up the things where our presence is not helping.

Let's be holy. Let's make Shelby Presbyterian Church stand out even more in the way we love.

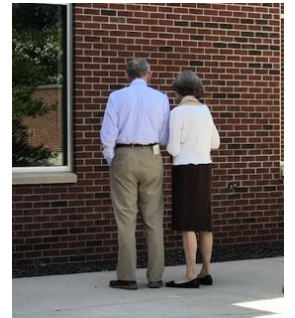

KIRKIN' O' THE TARTAN SERVICE HERITAGE SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 19, 2021

WORSHIP NOTES FOR KIRKIN' O' THE TARTAN SERVICE

About the Kirkin': Kirkin' is the Scottish word for blessing. It has come to describe a special service of worship that includes all Presbyterians. Together, we give thanks to God for our Presbyterian heritage and ask for God's continued blessing upon us.

The History: The Kirkin' o' the Tartans is of American origin, though based on history and legend in Scotland. After Bonnie Prince Charlie's forces were defeated by the English at the Battle of Culloden in 1746, Scotland once again came under British rule. To control the Scots, a special act was passed that forbade the carrying of arms and the wearing of kilts, plaid, or any tartan that represented Scots' heritage. Orders were given for British troops to kill upon sight any person dressed in Highland garb or displaying the tartan.

As the Legend Goes . . . This act prompted the stubborn Scots secretly to carry a piece of their tartan with them as they went to church, known as the Kirk. The minister then slipped a blessing (a Kirkin') into the service for the tartans. The prohibition against tartans lasted about 50 years. At the repeal of the act, the Church of Scotland celebrated with a Service of Family Covenant, at which time the tartan of each family was offered as a covenant expression for the Lord's blessing.

The First Kirkin’: The Saint Andrew’s Society of Washington, D.C. held the first Kirkin’ during the early years of World War II. The late Dr. Peter Marshall, an eloquent Scot, then Chaplain of the U.S. Senate and Pastor of New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, led the service in 1943, choosing “Kirkin’ o’ the Tartan” for the title of his sermon. He had preached many sermons in support of the British War Relief and the Scottish Clans Evacuation Plan. His sermons were so popular that a request was made for their publication, with proceeds from the sales designated for war relief programs. As the war continued, the Saint Andrew’s Society continued to hold services of unified prayer for the subjects of the British Isles. These became known as Kirkin’s.

The Service: The worship service is of traditional content, using much of the Church of Scotland form. Central to its theme is the presentation of various tartans—through the carrying of flags and the wearing of tartans—for a blessing. Clans provided protection and economic, political, and social support. The tartan is a symbol of love and togetherness. The Kirkin’ is intended to encourage all participants to reflect with thanksgiving on their own family and ethnic heritage and to celebrate God’s grace poured out for all generations.

The Beadle: The Beadle leads the worship procession carrying the Bible to the front of the sanctuary and the lectern. Reminiscent of an old custom of the Church of Scotland, this tradition highlights the Bible as the Word of our Lord and the center of our faith. The term beadle comes from the Latin term *bedullus*, a word referring to a messenger or summoner of parties to court, which in this case was the Session. The term *bedullus* proved too cumbersome and over time it was simplified to beadle.

Carolina Tartan Stoles: The Chancel Choir is wearing Carolina tartan stoles made by Carolyn Eddins and Betsy Fonvielle. The Carolina tartan was designed in Scotland and adopted as the official state tartan of both North and South Carolina. Both states received their share of immigration from Scotland. The Cape Fear River Valley in particular was home to a large settlement of Gaelic-speaking highlanders. The western region of the Carolinas was settled primarily by Ulster Scots, lowland Scots who migrated to Ireland in the 17th century, and later to the colonies. The Carolina tartan is based on a design associated with King Charles II of England;

he and his father, King Charles I, established the original land grants for the colony named after them.

About John Knox: Before he became a leader of the Reformation in Scotland, John Knox served as a bodyguard. During worship he stood in the front of the church holding a claymore sword to protect the pastor during those dangerous times.

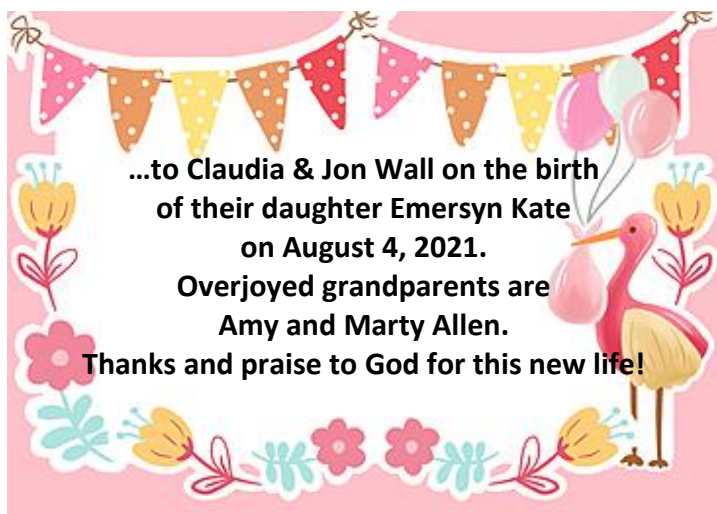
About the Protestant Reformation: The Reformation was begun in Germany in 1517 by Martin Luther who insisted on grace and faith in Jesus Christ alone as the heart of Christian faith. John Calvin, guided by the Bible and Luther’s example, helped to establish the Protestant Reformation in Geneva. This included a church governed by elders (presbyters), which became known as Presbyterian. From Calvin’s Geneva, Presbyterianism spread to Scotland, and then to the United States, among many other places around the world. John Knox would describe his experience in Calvin’s Geneva as “the most perfect school of Christian piety.”

About the Scots Confession: On August 17, 1560, Reformer John Knox and five of his colleagues presented the first Reformed confession of faith written in the English language to the Parliament of Scotland. “The Scots Confession,” as it is now known, united all of Scotland in its politics and in the church. From that day on, the nation was united under a Protestant Flag, emblazoned with the Cross of St. Andrew. This was the birth of the Church of Scotland, a church governed by elders, which became the parent of Presbyterian churches around the world.

More on the Scots Confession: The 25 Chapters of the Confession spell out a contemporary statement of the Christian faith as understood by the followers of John Calvin during his lifetime. Although the Confession and its accompanying documents were the product of the joint effort of a committee, its authorship is customarily attributed to John Knox.

The Book of Confessions: The Scots Confession is an official standard of the Church of Scotland, but was never meant to stand alone. It was approved along with other Catechisms, confessions and a Book of Common Order. Similarly, today, the Scots Confession does not stand alone. It is part of the PC(USA)’s Book of Confessions that expresses the faith of the church in specific times and places throughout history.

PRESBYTERY IN BRIEF JULY 31, 2021

Moderator Hal Bennett convened the meeting with a comprehensive, spirit-filled prayer of invocation at 9:01 a.m. He appointed hosts and co-hosts, and recognized the importance of honoring local Native Americans. He also happily recognized 22 first time Elders. Praise God!

Our wise and uber-gifted Stated Clerk Cam Murchison showed his mastery of clerk-ery by efficiently certifying a quorum (well over 150 Zoomed in and out of the meeting), gaining approval for a virtual meeting, giving a brief report and a quick orientation, and guiding us through the Consent Agenda approval. Printed reports were noted regarding - Guatemala Partnership, Finance, Building Hope, and Church Leadership School (*Congratulations and blessings to 2021 CLS*

Graduates Elizabeth Barbee and Janeen “Jan” Duncan!)

An effective, meaningful, inclusive Worship service followed, including Celebration of the Lord’s Supper, led by Revs. Jill Isola and Alex McNeil, and Amy Kim Kyremes-Parks. God’s Word was rightfully proclaimed, and God was thanked and glorified. Jill’s reflections on abundant love and radical hospitality was full of straightforward exegesis and real-world applications.

For the history buffs, we had a nice presentation from Archivist David Staniunas, from the Presbyterian Historical Society - which has been in Philadelphia since 1852, and has beaucoup files and documents. (dstaniunas@history.pcusa.org)

In the breakout rooms, we shared some joys, challenges, and progress post-COVID. It was encouraging and hopeful to hear what is going on at our churches.

General Council’s Sarah Thornburg presented motions to dissolve West Asheville and Duncan’s Creek Presbyterian churches, which were approved with sadness. On the other end of the spectrum, Superhero Clerk Cam Murchison was gratefully re-elected for another term. To God be the glory – *but thanks be to Cam!*

Jill Kimbirl gave the CE report on the work of the committee;

- “Lunch and Learn Event”, October 14 at 11:00 – “Day by Day”, SPIRITUAL PRACTICES FOR EDUCATORS – led by STEPHANIE FRITZ, Mission Coordinator for Christian Formation, PCUSA

- 2022 Spirituality Retreat – March 25-26, 2022 @ William Black Lodge. Mark your calendars.

Sarah Grace Montgomery enthusiastically reported on a full slate of Youth Ministry activities, highlighting the upcoming October 3 Youth Rally for middle and high school youth (2:45 - 6:00 pm), at Montreat, Upper Anderson. Keynote Speaker: Kari Morgan, Director of Youth Ministries and Recreation at FPC, Anderson, SC. (*NO registration needed.*)

Dwight Christenbury reported on Preparation for Ministry, including:

- Recommendation regarding Brandon Davis – Inquirer from Arbor Dale. The requirement that he remain an Inquirer for a full year before proceeding to Candidacy was waived with a unanimous vote.

- Presentation of Emily Beaver – from Black Mountain, moving from Inquirer to Candidate. She

gave a statement and was examined, approved, charged, and prayed for.

- Several questions about CPM were asked and addressed.

The ever-witty and creative John Pea channeled Marlon Brando to enhance COM activities – as “The COM-father”. Word is that God was decidedly pleased and amused, but unfortunately, there are pending lawsuits from the Brando estate and the Godfather saga franchise. Al Pacino is reportedly also considering legal action, and there are unsubstantiated reports that the Corleone family has put a hit out on John. Some private concerns were also expressed about the stuffed animals. It has also been reported that John has offered to guest host “Jeopardy”.

Our spirits were buoyed by the encouraging quantity and quality of new calls for church leadership:

- Lin Johnson, was Commissioned as Commissioned Pastor for Saluda Presbyterian Church.

- Daniel Commerford, new Pastor/Head of Staff at Gastonia First was presented and welcomed.

- Reed Conley (Lincolnton New Worshipping Community) gave an account of the new “Artisan Church” that is starting there.

- Drew Mangione, new Pastor/Head of Staff at Shelby Presbyterian Church, was presented and welcomed. (*All from a car!*)

- Caitlin Johnson was examined (having previously preached for our CPM) and approved for ordination to accept the call as designated Pastor at Oak Forest Presbyterian Church.

- Rachael McConnell was examined (preaching a sermon about God’s abundance as we try to regain some normalcy in today’s world) and approved for ordination to accept the call as pastor at Banner Elk Presbyterian Church.

The “COM-father” also advised the group that COM is involved in a study of minister compensation, seeking some better guidelines and additional consistency. He made us an offer we couldn’t refuse - increase the minimum Pastor annual salary to \$35,246.89, and a minimum 1.5% increase is suggested this year for all ministerial salaries.

General Presbyter Byron Wade reported on his activities and visions. He discussed some of his

priorities, his busy preaching and meeting schedule, and the new presbytery logo. He commented on his job thus far, and discussed the importance of the Matthew 25 initiative, communication, and educational opportunities.

Esta Jarrett offered beautiful Prayers of the People, emphasizing intercessory prayers.

Moderator Bennett pronounced the Benediction and adjourned us at 12:37 p.m.
