But that's not all, **September will also feature** several of our young people joining the church as full members through **Confirmation** and our celebration of **Heritage Sunday**, to remember our roots in the Reformed tradition in Scotland with the *Kirkin' O' the Tartans!*

It is a good feeling to know that in this moment, when the day is new, your church is Growing, Praising and Serving to live into our vision as a community. As we move forward, there will be more great ideas coming to life and lots for us to talk about. I'm excited and thankful that we will continue to reach out to our neighbors and grow as a family.



WORSHIP NOTES FOR 10:00 A.M. KIRKIN' O' THE TARTAN SERVICE HERITAGE SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 2022

About the Kirkin': Kirkin' is the Scottish word for blessing. It has come to describe a special service of worship that includes all Presbyterians. Together, we give thanks to God for our Presbyterian heritage and ask for God's continued blessing upon us.

The History: The Kirkin' o' the Tartans is of American origin, though based on history and legend in Scotland. After Bonnie Prince Charlie's forces were defeated by the English at the Battle of Culloden in 1746, Scotland once again came under British rule. To control the Scots, a special act was passed that forbade the carrying of arms and the wearing of kilts, plaid, or any tartan that represented Scots' heritage. Orders were given for British troops to kill upon sight any person dressed in Highland garb or displaying the tartan.

As the Legend Goes . . . This act prompted the stubborn Scots secretly to carry a piece of their tartan with them as they went to church, known as the Kirk. The minister then slipped a blessing (a Kirkin') into the service for the tartans. The prohibition against tartans lasted about 50 years. At the repeal of the act, the Church of Scotland celebrated with a Service of Family Covenant, at which time the tartan of each family was offered as a covenant expression for the Lord's blessing.

The First Kirkin': The Saint Andrew's Society of Washington, D.C. held the first Kirkin' during the early years of World War II. The late Dr. Peter Marshall, an eloquent Scot, then Chaplain of the U.S. Senate and Pastor of New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, led the service in 1943, choosing "Kirkin' o' the Tartan" for the title of his sermon. He had preached many sermons in support of the British War Relief and the Scottish Clans Evacuation Plan. His sermons were so popular that a request was made for their publication, with proceeds from the sales designated for war relief programs. As the war continued, the Saint Andrew's Society continued to hold services of unified prayer for the subjects of the British Isles. These became known as Kirkin's.

The Service: The worship service is of traditional content, using much of the Church of Scotland form. Central to its theme is the presentation of various tartans—through the carrying of flags and the wearing of tartans—for a blessing. Clans provided protection and economic, political, and social support. The tartan is a symbol of love and togetherness. The Kirkin' is intended to encourage all participants to reflect with thanksgiving on their own family and ethnic heritage and to celebrate God's grace poured out for all generations.

The Beadle: The Beadle leads the worship procession carrying the Bible to the front of the sanctuary and the lectern. Reminiscent of an old custom of the Church of Scotland, this tradition highlights the Bible as the Word of our Lord and the center of our faith. The term beadle comes from the Latin term *bedullus*, a word referring to a messenger or summoner of parties to court, which in this case was the

Session. The term *bedullus* proved too cumbersome and over time it was simplified to beadle.

Carolina Tartan Stoles: The Chancel Choir is wearing Carolina tartan stoles made by Carolyn Eddins and Betsy Fonvielle. The Carolina tartan was designed in Scotland and adopted as the official state tartan of both North and South Carolina. Both states received their share of immigration from Scotland. The Cape Fear River Valley in particular was home to a large settlement of Gaelic-speaking highlanders. The western region of the Carolinas was settled primarily by Ulster Scots, lowland Scots who migrated to Ireland in the 17th century, and later to the colonies. The Carolina tartan is based on a design associated with King Charles II of England; he and his father, King Charles I, established the original land grants for the colony named after them.

About John Knox: Before he became a leader of the Reformation in Scotland, John Knox served as a bodyguard. During worship he stood in the front of the church holding a claymore sword to protect the pastor during those dangerous times.

About the Protestant Reformation: The Reformation was begun in Germany in 1517 by Martin Luther who insisted on grace and faith in Jesus Christ alone as the heart of Christian faith. John Calvin, guided by the Bible and Luther's example, helped to establish the Protestant Reformation in Geneva. This included a church governed by elders (presbyters), which became known as Presbyterian. From Calvin's Geneva, Presbyterianism spread to Scotland, and then to the United States, among many other places around the world. John Knox would describe his experience in Calvin's Geneva as "the most perfect school of Christian piety."

About the Scots Confession: On August 17, 1560, Reformer John Knox and five of his colleagues presented the first Reformed confession of faith written in the English language to the Parliament of Scotland. "The Scots Confession," as it is now known, united all of Scotland in its politics and in the church. From that day on, the nation was united under a Protestant Flag, emblazoned with the Cross of St. Andrew. This was the birth of the Church of Scotland, a church governed by elders, which became the parent of Presbyterian churches around the world.

More on the Scots Confession: The 25 Chapters of the Confession spell out a contemporary statement of the Christian faith as understood by the followers of John Calvin during his lifetime. Although the Confession and its accompanying documents were the product of the joint effort of a committee, its authorship is customarily attributed to John Knox.

The Book of Confessions: The Scots Confession is an official standard of the Church of Scotland, but was never meant to stand alone. It was approved along with other Catechisms, confessions and a Book of Common Order. Similarly, today, the Scots Confession does not stand alone. It is part of the PC(USA)'s Book of Confessions that expresses the faith of the church in specific times and places throughout history.

Communications

<u>Clerk's Report</u> – John Schweppe requested volunteers to attend the Zoom Presbytery meeting to be held July 30, 2022. Ben Brooks responded in the affirmative.

<u>Deacon's Report</u> – Elizabeth Schweppe reported that the Mission and Ministry Committee highlights were as follows:

- Molly Brownlee reported that the backpack ministry will hereafter be directed to Turning Point Academy.
- Elizabeth reported the next Blood Drive is scheduled for August 12th.
- Elizabeth reported that the usher's schedule has been updated with some new members having volunteered to serve in November.

<u>Pastor's Report</u> – Drew provided his installation update, noting that the Presbytery Commission would meet in the Ladies Parlor prior to the 4:00 service.

- The offering to be collected at the installation service will be donated to the Presbytery Committee on Preparation of Ministry following a motion by Larry Wilson, seconded by Richard Fletcher, it was unanimously agreed that \$500.00 being the minimum donation contributed.
- Drew mentioned that officer training will be scheduled for a long Saturday meeting this Fall and an evening meeting in November.
- Installation ordination will be January 8, 2023 and the Officer Retreat the day before on January 7, 2023. **Committee Reports:**

<u>Personnel Committee</u> – Darlene Gravett reported that the Children's protection policy and the Bereavement Policy subcommittees have met and making progress.

<u>Property Committee</u> – Richard Fletcher reported that:

- The security code will be changed following the completion of the Rainbow Summer Session.
- The Boy Scout Hut/Harrill House ramp rebuild is underway with an expected expenditure of \$2,500.00 for materials and paid using food ministry funds with labor to be provided by church members.

- Window sashes for the Youth Room are ready to install by church members.
- Richard reported on necessary kitchen upgrades with the consensus present agreeing that a new stove/range is the most pressing need. Consensus supported the committee moving forward to acquire a replacement range in the approximate amount of \$5,000.00.

<u>Discipleship Committee</u> – Cheryl Sisk reported on efforts to recruit Sunday School Teachers.

• The first Wednesday night supper is scheduled for September 7th and meals will be provided for this gathering. Thereafter, Wednesday night suppers will be scheduled for the first Wednesday of each month with provision for meals to be determined.

<u>Finance Committee</u> - Scoot Dixon reported that expenses are off and that revenue is slightly down this being the norm for this time of the year.

• Scoot reported that the church received an anonymous gift for a new 12 passenger van presently on order. Larry Wilson made a motion to accept this gift, Seconded by Cheryl Sisk with unanimous vote.

<u>Fellowship Committee</u> Reports that it is providing a reception following Drew's installation on July 31st.

Worship & Music – Ben Brooks reported:

- Mary Connor has agreed to design a SPC Tartan.
- Traditional communion service will begin with Worldwide Communion on October 2nd.
- A September training session will be held for elders serving communion.

Old Business:

• Ratified unanimously the online meeting regarding Covid outbreaks, it was agreed that masks would not be mandatory but that the congregation be encouraged to wear masks during services.

New Business:

• Susan Bell suggested that from a safety standpoint, a wrought iron fence might be installed around the front of the church. Following discussion, the suggestion was referred to the Property Committee.

PRESBYTERY IN BRIEF 132ND STATED MEETING Presbytery of Western North Carolina July 30, 2022 (via Zoom)

Moderator Sarah Thornburg convened the meeting with a prayer of invocation at 9:01am. Following land acknowledgement, she thanked our hosts and cohosts for their work on our behalf. She also recognized first time Elders and corresponding members who were invited to introduce themselves.

Our Stated Clerk, Cam Murchison, provided a brief orientation and certified a quorum (over 141 zoomed into the meeting), gained approval for a virtual meeting, for the Docket, and the Consent Agenda. Cam also called our attention to: (see packet)

• information about signing up for Sacred Boundary Training.

- information about Clerk of Session Training and Reviewing of Church Records
- information about the Annual Report of the Committee on Nominating and Representation
- emphasized the importance of churches reporting pastors Terms of Call for 2022 to PWNC office a.s.a.p.

Our Moderator stressed the importance of reading the printed reports from the Guatemala Partnership, Mission Committee, Peace & Justice, Finance, Building H.O.P.E., and reports from our commissioners to the 225th General Assembly held in June in Louisville, KY (Ruling Elders Dana Seller, Sarah Thornburg, and Collin Caldwell, and Teaching Elder Whit Malone).

Our Worship service, including the Celebration of the Lord's Supper, was led by John Pea, Commissioned Pastor of Robinson Memorial Presbyterian Church, who creatively "channeled" LinManuel Miranda's rap style from the musical "Hamilton" to introduce our worship and his sermon, "Who Tells The Story?", from Acts 26:4-18. In the light of the pandemic and diminishing church membership and attendance in a changing world, John encouraged us to come up with new and bold ways to proclaim the Good News, which he exemplified with his use of media in his sermon.

In the breakout rooms, we were encouraged to share with each other new and creative ways we have tried during the pandemic to reach out to our congregations and the community.

General Council chairperson, Hal Bennett, read the "Resolution of Appreciation" for the service of Billy Robinson as Associate Presbyter for Mission, Witness & Church Support since October 25, 2016, commending him for his "work well done and ministry faithfully carried out", which was adopted by the presbytery. Members of the presbytery are encouraged to communicate our appreciation and well wishes to Billy, who will now be a member-at-large.

Hal also called our attention to the following reports:

- Report of distribution from sale of church properties: \$200,000 Affordable Housing projects, administered by Mission Committee; \$50,000 (over 4 years) Artisan Church; \$200,000 New Church Development
- Nickel-A-Meal Grants report \$58,000 was distributed to five hunger-fighting agencies located in various parts of the presbytery and Nkhoma Hospital in Malawi. Needed host for October 2023 and October 2024 Presbytery meetings.

The Guatemala Partnership Report was presented by Marie Palacios, Kevin Frederick, and Ellen Dozier who gave a brief synopsis using media about their trip to Guatemala in May. They visited sister churches and schools and visited with pastors and church leaders with which the Partnership program has been developing relationships for over 28 years, working in the

Report on the 225th General Assembly "Impressions" by Collin Caldwell, Ruling Elder, Bryson City Presbyterian Church, who shared many positive experiences of the GA, whose theme was "From Lament to Hope". He served on the Immigration Committee which sought to come up with concrete ways to express "loving our neighbors as ourselves".

Dwight Christenbury reported for the Committee on Preparation for Ministry. The committee's recommendation regarding Brandon Davis, Inquirer from Arbor Dale: "That his period of candidacy be concluded on July 30, 2022 in order that he may be free to receive and accept a call," was approved by common consent without objection.

Also, our attention was called to Jill Kimbirl, member of FPC Belmont, being enrolled as an inquirer on May 18, 2022.

Committee On Ministry report was made by Jim Taylor. The following recommendations were approved by common consent without objection:

- In 2023, the PWNC minimum effective fulltime salary be increased by 4.3% to \$36,762.50, representing 57% of the 2023 median. In 2023, Presbytery recommends that its congregations consider at least a 4.3% increase to effective salary for all other ministers.
- "Pursuant to PWNC policy on transitional pastor becoming installed pastor, that the congregation of Bryson City Presbyterian Church be allowed to call

Elizabeth Newman as the Installed Pastor with a designated term of two years."

- Recommend the validation of ministry for: A. Rev. Joe Bennett, Chaplain, Compassionate Care WNC B. Rev. Ryan Brakemeyer, Pastor, Grace Reformed United Church of Christ C. C. Rev. John Campbell, Counselor, Eastatoe Trail Counseling and Consultation Center D. D. Rev. Daniel Tipton, Grief Services Director, Four Seasons Compassion for Life
- Recommend the suggested amendments for Section IV of The Policy for Transitional to Installed Pastor (see packet)
